Now, I'm a cat person but these dogs seemed just like big cats (we had two). They were so docile and quiet - loving any kind of attention. Something I surely could handle.

Terry always had dogs. I really wanted to do this for him. We filled out an application.

Sue Murzynski invited us to one of the bubble bath fund raisers to meet some people and their dogs. Oh my gosh! A room filled with the friendliest people and at least 15 dogs. It was so quiet – not a bark. Lots of chatting, petting and by the time we left I could not wait

until we got our grey! We had our interview and passed. We were so anxious that we indicated that we had no preference as to male or female, age or color (thinking this would make things go faster!). We were told it might still take a month or two. We could hardly wait. We immediately bought a huge crate, feeding station, dog bed and even books. All the things we thought we'd need.

Then, unbelievably, Sue called in just a week. She already had a dog for us! A large black male. Although I was still happy, I couldn't help but admit that would have been my absolute last pick!



A male? So big? Black? What are the chances? I guess I was guilty of being one of those black dog "snobs."

Communications and special events are critical when it comes to the success of any organization, especially a non-profit group like Buffalo Greyhound Adoption. The two roles go hand in hand – and so do Julie and Mike Maciejewski, the husbandand-wife team who serve BGA by leading its communications and events functions, respectively.

Julie grew up in Winter Park, Florida and met Mike, a Cheektowaga native, while he was going to school at the U.S. Navy base in Orlando. They have been married for 34 years and moved back to Western New York when Mike's enlistment was up in 1982. They have two grown sons. Greg lives in Virginia with

his wife, Megan and their three children, Ashlyn, Brooklyn and Rian. Like his dad, Rob serves in the U.S. Navy and is stationed at Patuxent River Naval Air Station, Maryland.

The Maciejewskis first applied to adopt a greyhound through BGA in 2000, but came to realize that the dog they had at the time did not relate well to the greys. They subsequently got a second dog, who did well in a multi-pet situation, so after their first dog passed away, they reapplied to adopt a greyhound.

"We saw BGA at Walden Galleria shortly after losing Jade and that pretty much sealed the deal," said Julie. "Sasha (the couple's surviving pet) did well at the home visit." And the story ended well: Kandi, now seven years old, joined the Maciejewski family in November 2007. Her "big sister" Sasha, a shepherd mix, will turn 10 this summer. Julie noted that Sasha is the "mother hen" for the greyhounds that she and Mike foster as part of their BGA work.

Julie and Mike began fostering greyhounds in 2009 and "have really liked getting to know other dogs that come to BGA," said Julie. She noted that she's often thought of adopting a second grey, but for now "fostering has satisfied my craving, but not on a permanent basis. We look at the foster dogs as our grand-

children coming for a visit – and then they go home. We've come close to 'failing' a couple of times, but really enjoy seeing our fosters with their forever families at various BGA functions."

The Maciejewskis joined the BGA board as Communications Co-Chairs in 2011. Recently, Julie took over the role of Events Chair. "It has been a learning experience being on the board and we have enjoyed getting to know other members of the BGA family," said Julie.

Julie is active in the music program at Pendleton Center United Methodist Church, where her passion is hand bells, which she has played for nearly 30 years. Mike is a golfer and a lifelong Buffalo sports fan. The Maciejewski family has lived in Lockport for 28 years.

for me – do I adopt *three* dogs? Well the obvious answer to that is "yes, why not; what's one more dog?" When I stopped by Sue's house to visit with Brian, she also had another foster there, her name was Myrtle, a white and black greyhound. Myrtle's eyes said to me, I know that Brian is one cute fella, but I'm going home with you!!!



Sue assured me that she had a wonderful family in mind for Brian, which helped to make the decision of taking Myrtle and not Brian a bit easier.

Since getting all three of the dogs, my life has changed for the better. Each one of them, Derrick, Shawn and Myrtle, have their own distinct and unique personality. Derrick is the (dog) master of the house and his domain, he's quiet, col-

lected, thoughtful and confident. He is happy in a group or on his own. He is also very playful. If it squeaks or has fur on it, Derrick must own it. He also has no issue with counter-surfing right in front of me. Although the minute I say his name in a stern voice to get down from the counter, he does so immediately. I call him "The Perfect Dog".

Shawn is a bit more on the nervous side and is skinny as a rail, no matter how much he eats. I call him Bill Bones Baggins. He's nervous and shaky on hardwood and tile floors, he won't climb the stairs without help, and he's needs a step to get into the car. He is also a barker. He barks at other dogs, when people come to the front door, or when his brother and sister are skillfully mastering the

hardwood and tile floors, as if signaling to say to them "wait for me" (although I'm not going to come because I'm afraid of the floors)!

Shawn is a great instigator of play and one of the more playful of the trio. His preference of play is outdoors in the yard with his sister. The squeaky furry things don't interest him as much as the outdoors and running with Myrtle.

Lastly, Myrtle. She is an incredibly playful, happy, energetic, adventurous and curious dog. She'll be four in July and still plays like she's a puppy. She is also a foodie – she will eat anything she can get her paws on. I call her my little Hoover. It doesn't matter if it is fish food. cat food or my food. If it falls from the counter to the floor, Myrtle is there to suck it up. She sticks by my side like glue too. If I get up from the couch, she has one eye watching my every move. If I head for the door, she's up and at my side ready and wanting to go with me. She is definitely bonded to me; not as much as she is bonded to food, but bonded nonetheless.

I often think of Brian as well and what the house would be like with a fourth greyhound. It is very comforting knowing that Brian is enjoying his WNY retirement spot with a terrific family that I hear often, loves him dearly.

What a difference all three dogs have made in my life. I wake up to wagging tails, good morning barks and sometimes even sloppy kisses. How is it even possible to have a bad day when each morning starts like that?

Yummy Dog Treats: Sardine and Cheese Balls

Makes approximately 300 (25 dozen) (recipe can be halved)

6 eggs
6 cans sardines in water
(undrained)
1/4 cup vegetable or safflower oil
1 cup shredded mozzarella
2 cups quick rolled oats

3 cups+ all-purpose white flour

Mix sardines, eggs and oil. Stir in cheese, then oats. Add flour a cup at a time, mixing thoroughly; continue to add flour gradually until dough becomes stiff.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll dough into bite-size small balls (dusting dough and hands with a bit more flour can make this easier) and flatten into cookies. Place on baking sheet covered with foil (treats can be placed closely since they don't spread during cooking) and bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes, then lower heat to 300 and continue baking for another 20 or 30 minutes until treats are crunchy/ dry (not spongy in the middle) and slightly toasted. Let cool completely, then store in freezer up to six months, or fridge for a week.

Alternative to rolling all those little balls, roll dough flat to between 1/8" and 1/4" thick, then score into 3/4" squares with a knife. Bake until dry as above.

mom said he didn't answer to it or his call name from the track, so we renamed him "Jett." He quickly took to his new name. He was the *best* dog. Okay - I know. They all are!

When he came he was four and a half years old and adjusted to our home beautifully. He'd just trot to the door when he wanted to go out, loved to go for rides in the car, loved going out to lay in the shade when I'd do my gardening. Jett just liked being with us, being pet and getting treats and attention. Every single night, when we'd go to bed, he'd walk through the house, as if checking that all was well, get a drink then come into our room, whimper for a "good night pet" then lie next to our bed and fall asleep. He may have looked fierce but

he was just a big goof. Our Big Goof!

After about a year and a half, we succumbed to "chipping" as it's known. We wanted to get a pal for Jett. I sat on the edge of the couch and whispered to him (I really did this!) "I hope your sister is going to be as good as you are because you're the reason we're doing this". Not to worry.

Piper, a "bounced" 6 year old brindle female joined us and they were pals from the get go. She was, and is just as perfect.

Jett had a great racing career. When he first came to us, he could run speedy laps in the yard.

But as he aged, he lost most of

his teeth and arthritis started to slow him down. Last week our big goof slipped on the linoleum floor and suffered a horrible fracture in his left shoulder that proved what we had long feared. His bones were weak and brittle. He was suffering from bone cancer. Given his size and age, prognosis wasn't good. Since Jett was already sedated and peacefully asleep for the x-ray, we said our tearful goodbyes.

We sobbed all the way home from the vet. "Never again" we cried. It has made our home so quiet and solemn. Piper is still looking for him.

Four days later we called Sue for another dog. But, this time *it has* to be *black*.
